# **ARTIST TALK BIOS**

Joseph Audeh is an artist whose work engages architecture, environmental change and technology. His various projects imagine solutions to meet future energy needs, by combining old forms of environmental knowledge with breakthroughs in emerging technology. Audeh was selected as a Berkeley Design Fellow (2011), a finalist for the Frieze Writer's Prize (2012), and a traveling artist for the River Has Two Banks at Makan Art Space, Amman (2012). He graduated from New York University with a BA in Urban Design/Architecture Studies and recently completed an artist residency at Townhouse Gallery, Cairo (2013). He has worked for Qalandiya International in Ramallah (2012) and currently lives in New York.

Samira Badran uses a broad range of media and often appropriated or found images to disassemble and then reconfigure the details in her enigmatic, multi-layered works. Badran's exhibition history is extensive and began in 1976 with a presentation at the YWCA in Jerusalem. Numerous shows across the Arab world, Europe and the US followed including presentations in Baghdad, Washington, Havana, and New York. Her most recent solo exhibition was at University Rovira i Virgili, Salou, Spain (2008). Her work has been included in group exhibitions at Can Felipa, Barcelona, Spain (2009), The Jerusalem Show, Al Ma'mal Foundation, Jerusalem (2009), the Rafia Gallery, Damascus, Syria (2009), the Sharjah Biennial (2009), Gemeentemuseum Den Haag/Gemak, the Netherlands (2008), and Al Hoash, Jerusalem (2007).

Mary Tuma was born in Oakland, California and is of Palestinian origin. She received her Masters of Fine Arts from the University of Arizona in 1994. She has made five solo exhibitions in the USA and in Jerusalem and has participated every year since 1993 in a number of group exhibitions mainly in the USA but also in Egypt, Jerusalem and now Bethlehem. Miss. Tuma is a Professor of Art at the University of North Carolina, Charlotte, USA, working with Three-dimensional Art at the Department of Art.

# **About the Moderator**

Raouf J. Halaby is a native of Jerusalem, Palestine. In 1959 he moved from Upper Bakaa to Beirut, Lebanon and graduated with honors from the National Protestant Secondary School in 1964. He was awarded a Bachelor and Master's degrees from Ouachita Baptist University, and his Ed.D. in the College Teaching of English from Texas A&M University in 1973. He studied Art History in Rome, Italy.

Since 1973, he has been teaching at his alma mater and is in his 41st year as a Professor of English and Art. Halaby has served on national, regional and local boards, as a consultant for University of Minnesota's Immigration History Research center. He is a widely-published author, a regular contributor to CounterPunch, a photographer, and an award-winning sculptor, whose works have been exhibited nationally. He is a peace activist dedicated to the cause of Palestine and her dispossessed people.
