

## Huda Lutfi

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## Timeline

Huda's artistic career stems directly from her academic career as a cultural historian. Her higher education was completed in Canada where she obtained a PhD in Islamic culture and history. Since then Huda has worked mainly in Cairo as an Associate Professor at the American university teaching Islamic culture and history. She worked briefly in Boston from 1991-1992 when she was invited to lecture in Arab history and culture at Harvard University. Huda is a self taught artist interested in cultural composition and bricolage, but did not start painting and producing installation work in a dedicated manor until 1992. Huda considers her artwork to link to parallel her historical research as a process of uncovering the past for reflection in a contemporary environment which necessarily distorts the original meanings and intentions. Huda has been exhibiting her work since the 1990's and has had numerous prestigious group and solo exhibitions in Cairo and the US. She won the second prize at the biennale for women artists of the Mediterranean in Marseilles 1996 and a Ford Foundation Artist Grant, Cairo 1999-2000. Huda's work can be seen in various museums and art institutions worldwide

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including the Indianapolis Museum, The Hague World Bank and MOMA.

Since 1999 Huda has initiated a number of painting workshops with children which she considers a productive experience for both parties. These workshops have developed into exhibitions and collaborative projects with other international artists. Huda has a prestigious studio at the Townhouse gallery in Cairo from which she produces work for exhibition.

Huda's artwork began in the 1990's as experiments with collage and bricolage of imagery and historical references recontextualised but in recent years Huda has focused on installation and the use of the found object in new settings. As Huda is particularly interested in Islamic culture, but also the interaction with Western culture, her work frequently contains historical and tradition based references. She has frequently referred to her work as 'cultural play' or metamorphosis. She has practiced Arabic calligraphy and learnt Arabic art and architectural history which she frequently juxtaposed into modern settings. A lot of her imagery references the magical and spiritual past of the Arab, Coptic and Pharaonic worlds. Despite her references to the past Huda uses them for the contemporary moment, challenging the human condition in today's world. Like many artists in Egypt Huda is commited to the achievement of freedom of expression and human rights through art.

In 2006 Huda put together a collection called 'Arayis' in which she experimented with the use of dolls as installations. The dolls represented the feminine through their connection with the female through the local Egyptian tradition of female doll making. 'Arayis' included the installation that Le Violon Bleu is currently exhibiting 'Bounty Dolls Star'. These distinctive black dolls have the Egyptian saying 'Oh lovely people, bounty is for all' painted in Arabic lettering onto their surfaces. The dolls are a metaphor for the conventional female characteristics of generosity and peace. They carry, physically, the feminine potential for projecting the message of harmony and equity. Despite the traditional nature of the wording, Huda's installation has a contemporary message and presentation suitable for the modern world in a time of moral turmoil.
